Director of Finance Report

I am pleased to present the Audited Financial Report for the Year ended 30 April 2018.

RESULT FOR THE YEAR

The Club has recorded a net profit of \$42,931 for the financial year ended 30 April 2018 after amortisation, depreciation and accounting adjustments, but before capital expenditure.

The net profit prior to the accounting adjustments mentioned above was \$ 50,737.

STATEMENT OF FINANCIAL POSITION

As at 30 April 2018, the Club's net assets were valued at \$1,977,181.

The Club's cash assets amounted to \$235,662 at the end of the financial year.

LOOKING FORWARD

The Club is looking to further expand its revenue base in the coming years via sponsorship, membership income, fundraising and an increase in our commercial activities.

We are aware that, while we need to ensure our members have good and reliable equipment and services available to them, we also need to ensure that there is money put aside for future building maintenance costs. The club is guided by the long term maintenance schedule in place for the building and is budgeting for surpluses in the next few years to ensure there is sufficient funds for this capital expenditure.

This year, the club has increased its financial reporting capabilities by employing a part time bookkeeper, upgrading its accounting software and implementing monthly budgets that allows the board to track actual performance to budget. This allows the Board to make financial decisions with up to date information at hand.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

I would like to thank all of our members who donate their time, expertise and goods to the club. Whilst this may not be reflected in the financial accounts of the club, your contribution is invaluable as it frees up our cash resources to be used providing equipment and services to our members.

Finally, I would also like to thank our administration staff. Their knowledge and support throughout the year is very much appreciated.

Notes to the Financial Statements

Note 1: Statement of significant accounting policies

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act Western Australia. The board has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The report, except for the cash flow information, has been prepared on an accruals basis in that it accounts for debtors, creditors, employee provisions and prepaid building lease income, but has not included other accruals and prepayments in order to be consistent with year accounting treatment. The report is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values, or except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following material accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

(a) Income tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the association is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

(b) Property, plant and equipment

Property

Freehold land and buildings are measured at their fair value (being the amount for which an asset could be exchanged between knowledgeable willing parties in an arm's length transaction), based on periodic, but at least triennial, valuations by external independent valuers, less subsequent depreciation for buildings.

Increases in the carrying amount arising on revaluation of land and buildings are credited to a revaluation surplus in equity. Decreases that offset previous increases of the same asset are charged against fair value reserves directly in equity. Decreases that offset previous increases of the same asset are charged against fair value reserves directly in equity; all other decreases are charged to the statement of comprehensive income.

Any accumulated depreciation at the date of revaluation is eliminated against the gross carrying amount of the asset and the net amount is restated to the revalued amount of the asset.

Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by the committee to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount of those assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows which will be received from the assets' employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have not been discounted to their present values determining recovering amounts.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets, excluding land and buildings, are depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset was held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

(c) Cash on hand

Cash on hand included cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

(d) Accounts receivable and other debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors includes amounts due from customers. Receivable expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivable are classified as non-current assets.

(e) Revenue and other income

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

If conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

Cash receipts are recognised as income when they are deposited into the bank account

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

(f) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australia Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

(g) Accounts payable and other payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days or recognition of the liability.

Note 1 : Statement of significant accounting policies continued

(h) Employee provisions

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee provisions have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled

(i) Leases

Leases of PPE, where substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset (but not the legal ownership) are transferred to the association, are classified as finance leases.

Finance leases are capitalised by recording an asset and a liability at the lower of the amounts equal to the fair value of the leased property or the present value of the minimum lease payments, including any guaranteed residual values. Lease payments are allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for that period

Leased assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter of their estimated useful lives or the lease term. Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses in the periods in which they are incurred

(j) Impairment of assets

At the end of each reporting period, the committee reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value in use, to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised in the income and expenditure statement

(k) Inventories on hand

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost or net realisable value.



Audit Report qualification Basis for Qualified Opinion



Accordingly, as the evidence available to me about revenue from these sources was limited, my audit procedures for these aforementioned fundraising activities had to be restricted to the amounts recorded in the financial records. I therefore am unable to express an opinion on whether this aforementioned fundraising cash revenue obtained by the Club is complete.

Qualified opinion

In my opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, the financial report of the Fremantle Surf Life Saving Association Inc. presents fairly in all material respects in accordance with the accounting policies described in Note 1 to the financial statements, the financial position of the Club at 30th April 2018 and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended.

Emphasis of matter

I draw attention to Note 1 (e) in the financial report which describes the revenue recognition policy of the Club including the limitations that exist in relation to the recording of cash receipts from cash sales, donations and other cash fundraising activities. Revenue from this source represents a sizeable proportion of the Club's revenue. My opinion is unmodified in respect of this matter.

And Invitational Surf Belt Races

Each Year in November, our Club holds a special ceremony to remember the officers and crew of the HMAS Sydney II, which was lost on November 19th 1941 with all 645 crew members in an epic sea battle with the German raider 'Kormoran'. We hold the ceremony on Leighton Beach in front of our assembled nippers, parents and seniors, and recall that many of the crew of HMAS Sydney II spent time at Leighton and our surf club when not on active duty. In February 1941, the crew of HMAS Sydney II presented our club with a hand-made reel, which in the day was the prime means of rescuing people from the surf. The reel is displayed each year and plays a central part in the ceremony.

Lifesaving Report

A huge thank-you goes to all Fremantle active members this season. Over 400 of our members have taken part in patrolling the 3km of beach including Port Beach, Leighton Beach and Mosman Beach, during the six month period from end of September 2017 to beginning April 2018. This resulted in around 8,400 patrol hours including 1,100 hrs for water safety to cover our Sunday nipper program.

As usual, the conditions on the beach were fairly benign this season, but we still performed nine rescues (one on rescue board, one on jetski and seven using IRB); 331 First Aids (over 300 marine stings and 15 cuts/abrasions) and over 200 prevention actions. A special thankyou goes to the all our Patrol Captains, Vice Captains and IRB Drivers, who make up the leadership of each patrol team.

In addition to rostered patrols and nipper water safety, we provided water safety and lifesaving support to events like the Port to Pub swim and Fremantle Ocean Classic. We also received a number of requests from other organisations to provide water safety for their activities.

New initiatives were introduced this season, based on feedback provided by the patrol leadership teams -

- ✓ Review/audit of all patrols to assist the lifesaving team to determine the best way to support all of Fremantle's patrol teams. A number of learnings were actioned from the audits completed. Thanks to Jack Dowie for the development of a very comprehensive audit workbook.
- ✓ Scenario sample sheets to provide guidelines for additional patrol activities, which has been used to keep patrol team skills at a high level.
- ✓ All new SRCs were rostered onto various Sunday morning patrols to gain patrol experience while volunteering with and

learning from more of our senior club members on the beach. Positive feedback from this program has been received, as parents were able to manage the continual Sunday morning commitment to surf club, either on patrol or taking part in the youth program.

Equipment grants from both SLSWA and SLSA allowed us to purchase new rescue equipment, including a number of rescue boards, rescue tubes, oxy viva, signage and flags.

The lifesaving committee reviewed the annual lifesaving and patrolling award basis. The outcome was have a single overall award to a Fremantle patrolling member who upholds the Club's values; is a positive SLSA ambassador (SLSA's 'brand' or reputation has tremendous value); meets patrol requirements as well as additional patrol/water safety volunteer roles; is skilled in lifesaving areas of rescue, resuscitation, patrol

methodology and first aid; is committed to training, development and mentorship, and actively participates in and supports Club events. The committee has developed a detailed matrix with these criteria for all nominated candidates. The award has been termed "Champion Lifesaver".

While there were a number of good candidates in the running, this season's Champion Lifesaver is Kitty Eichner.

With the close of another successful patrol season, a special thanks goes to our lifesaving team for their dedicated efforts: Liam Burke (Patrol Officer), Kelly Aiken-Fox (Lifesaving Committee), Jo Niven (First Aid Officer) and John Summers (Mobile Equipment, Radio Officer, IRB officer)..

IRB training was successfully conducted and proves a focus of enthusiasm amongst the younger crew.

Cath and John Skipsey coordinated the Surf Rescue Certificate for the U14 age group, with 52 being awarded their certificate.

Two SRC Adult courses were held where Peter Hastie's experience enabled seventeen parents to become involved with the Nippers water safety. Peter also conducted the up-dated Advanced Resuscitation Techniques programme where eight new ART (AID) members obtained their certificate.

Our commercial operation is proving its worth as a fund raising segment of the club. A number of schools are utilising our services to train their staff in the Community Surf Rescue Certificate. Thanks to Mike Shaw who has enabled the success of this venture.

We continue to seek suitably qualified and committed members to become trainers with one new trainer joining the group and three other members to gain their trainer's qualification in the next season.

While maintaining life saving awards for new and existing members, is the basis of the education portfolio, we also are keen to develop the life skills of our members, generally and shall continue to identify opportunities.

The 'Fremantle Ocean Classic'

The 'Leighton Swim Thru' open water swim (over 1600m and 3200m distances) has been a major fundraising event for the Fremantle Surf Life Saving Club, and was held annually for thirty-six years. Over recent years, competitor numbers have tailed off, due in part to poor weather conditions last year in the leadup to the event, but also due to competition from other events such as the Busselton Jetty Swim.

For our 2018 event, a major rebranding effort was undertaken to reinvigorate interest. The event was moved by one week to a vacant weekend, to avoid competition with the Busselton event. It was also moved later to be the last open water swim prior to the Rottnest Channel Swim, promoting participation by swimmers seeking a final 'tapering' swim before the 20km to Rottnest Island;

The event was also rebadged 'the Fremantle Ocean Classic', reflecting the incorporation of a number of new events on the day.

The inclusion of new events allows competitors to compete in more than one event, as well as attracting a range of new entrants who aren't just interested in distance swimming. The new events include a 1600m Malibu board race, a 'dash for cash'-style 400m sprint, a 4 x 400m relay event and 1 km and 2 km beach runs. Plus, the short format events also allow a younger demographic to become involved.

A number of well-known sponsors came on board to provide cash and goods for age group and gender winners in events –

- Vouchers from the local restaurant 'Bib and Tucker', local café 'Orange Box' and fitness business 'Core Fitness'.

In addition, other sponsors included Aussie Natural Spring Water, Brumby's Bakery and Frank's Gourmet Meats, who provided bottled water, bread buns and bacon for the event breakfast.

A big part of holding such an event is to make it as safe as possible, and so our Surf Club engaged a number of its (mainly younger) volunteer members to paddle rescue boards and man jet-skis to provide water safety throughout the duration of the water events.

Water course setup commenced at first light, with a number of inflatable rescue boats setting out the twelve course markers. The markers were loaned by the 'Port to Pub' organisers, through our strong mutual relationship developed over the several years we have supported their event originating from our beach and using our facilities.

In 2016 and 2017, numbers of entrants to the Leighton Swim Thru event were 203 and 93 respectively. The 2017 event numbers were particularly affected by forecasts of lightning and storms a few days ahead that didn't actually eventuate! By contrast, the new and improved Fremantle Ocean Classic attracted a very satisfying 320

competitors, which was our best result in five years with 42 of those entries being in the new events.

And the event also showcased some of the best known faces in WA open water swimming. The 1600m swim was won by Olympian Simon Huitenga and Rottnest Channel Swim duo winner Sacha Downing, while the 3200m swim was won by sixteen year-old swimming sensation Byron Kimber (ahead of Rottnest Channel Swim veterans Tim Hewitt and Rhys Mainstone) and Jamie Bowler. Club members finished on the podium too, with Zac Evans and Sienna Ashe winning the 400m swims, Zac Evans again in the 1km beach run, Zac Coleman in the 2km beach run and Nick Dart rounding out with the 1600m Malibu board race.

The event will continue annually, as it always has, with even more improvements being contemplated for next year, such as a 'stand-up paddleboard' race to cater for general public and a surf boat sprint to attract members from other surf clubs.

Informal feedback from competitors was that they were very pleased to see the surf club races being continued and that this new event format was really exciting. Fremantle Junior receives SLSWA Coastal Bravery Award

Finn McIntyre, who was in our Under 13's this season, has received the SLSWA Bronze Medallion for Courage—Youth Award, which is awarded to anyone under the age of 16 who performs a lifesaving act demonstrating courage on the West Australian coast, or in the case of a member of Surf Life Saving WA, where they may have used skills learned through their participation in surf lifesaving, to perform an act demonstrating courage away from the coast.



Finn used his quick thinking and skills learnt at Fremantle to help a parent in desperate need with their 10 month old baby, on a recent family holiday to Karijini National Park during the July school break.

The McIntyre family were visiting Kermit's Pool, a gorge in Karijini National Park, with high sides and a water channel running through the middle. The water was icy cold (as the days experienced extremely low temperatures at night and was in shadow all day). As the McIntyre family progressed through the gorge, they came across a man wading

through the water with a 10 month old baby on his shoulders. Both man and baby were dressed in simple summer clothes. As the water got deeper, the man got progressively deeper in the water, until his shoulders were just above the waterline. In a flash, the man disappeared below the surface of the icy water, while trying to hold

his baby high above his submerged head. He was fighting to keep his child out of the water as much as he could, whilst trying to find any kind of footing on the slippery submerged rocks.

Before anyone else in the gorge could react, Finn jumped into the water and swam quickly to the other side, pulling himself up on the wet slippery rocks. As soon as Finn had a safe footing, he grabbed the baby from the submerged man's hands, enabling the man to resurface and obtain a secure position. Whilst all of this was happening, bystanders created a commotion with lots of shouting and panic. Finn's quick reaction to the situation certainly ensured the baby wasn't injured, or worse.

Finn's father, Andy, said, "I have no doubt that Finn's reaction was in part due to the training and moral responsibility he has learnt through surf club and very much his own strength of character. As his parents, Rach and I couldn't be more proud of the way he reacted and conducted himself in this situation".

Multicultural Beach Awareness and Surf Safety Program

We are very proud of a program we have created through Centrecare in partnership with two schools—Lynwood SHS and Aranmore Catholic College, which have units for newly-arrived migrants attached—called 'Beach Awareness and Surf Safety'.

Many of the teenage kids in these units come from the Middle East, Asia and Africa—countries like Iraq, Syria, Myanmar, torn by civil strife, or who have never even seen the ocean.

Run by Matt Elliott and Mike Shaw, the two hour sessions showed around fifty kids how to be safe at the beach. Using Leighton Beach as the backdrop, they were shown how to identify rips and dangerous surf conditions. They then took a tour of the Club's gear shed to show them the range of rescue equipment we use—from tubes and boards to IRB's and jet-skis. Lastly, we showed a couple of videos of the different rescue equipment in action! To close out the day, all the kids got into the fun and had some free time in the water, testing out the rescue tubes and boards themselves.

Even though in their past lives, they may have been distrustful of people in uniform, we also taught them to trust the guys in the red-and-yellow and to feel safe in approaching them on the beach for any assistance!

For each school, we ran a separate session in the classroom covering potentially hazardous marine creatures and being sun-smart. Feedback from the school's coordinators is that it has been an outrageous success, and will be continued.

Junior Development Report

Each season, our nippers participate in the Surf Education Program set by Surf Life Saving Australia. This year, a revised program moved away from concentrating on surf sports to furthering Surf Education with the ultimate aim of producing Surf Life Savers. The program aims to provide the best experience to all nipper participants, provide instruction and opportunities through activities, promote a team environment, sportsmanship and encourage physical and social development. The program was successfully delivered by our Age Group Managers to over 500 nippers this year, with more than 90% of our nippers successfully completing the program and receiving their Surf Education certificates on our final day in March.

NIPPER CAMP

Over 70 excited nippers headed to Point Peron in February for a camp coordinated by John Marsh. We christened some new camp leaders this year, who found the nights blurring into the days. This year for activities, we kept some old favourites by heading down to Secret Harbour for surfing, and snorkelling down at Point Peron. Karaoke made a return visit with some memorable performances. Yet again, some of the quietest members nippers stunned the audience. Saturday afternoon saw us spending the afternoon competing on water drenched inflatables. A night of spotlight provided a highlight for many of the kids sneaking in around hiding from John's heavy duty torch. The camp wound up with the Sunday morning camp photo, presentation of medals to the winning team before sending 70 nippers home to their parents with some very tired camp leaders heading home for a stiff drink and a little lie down.

Unfortunately, it looks as if Fremantle's long association with Point Peron Camp has come to an end, with the expected closure of the camp in 2019. Our camp leaders are already looking for a replacement camp location.

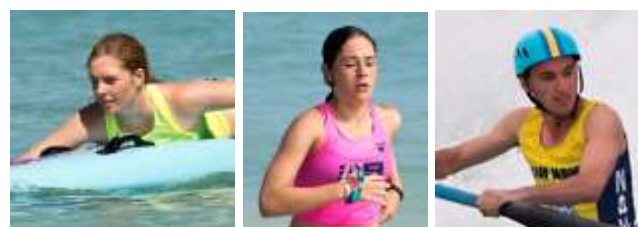

Fremantle Beach Flags Legend Honoured

Fremantle Beach Flags legend Robert Pickard was honoured in March 2018 with induction to the SLSWA Sporting Hall of Fame. A beach flags maestro, Rob won three Australian and six WA Open Men's Beach Flags Championships during the 1970's and 80's.

He represented Western Australia as a competitor in five State Teams, being appointed State Vice-Captain in 1982 and State

Captain in 1984. After retiring as a competitor, Rob was appointed State Team Coach for 1984-85.

Rob won the WA State Beach Flags Championships in 1976, 1977, 1981, 1982, 1983 and 1984. He also teamed with Vince Hayes, John McCourt and David Heatley to win the 1977 State Beach Relay Championship for Fremantle.

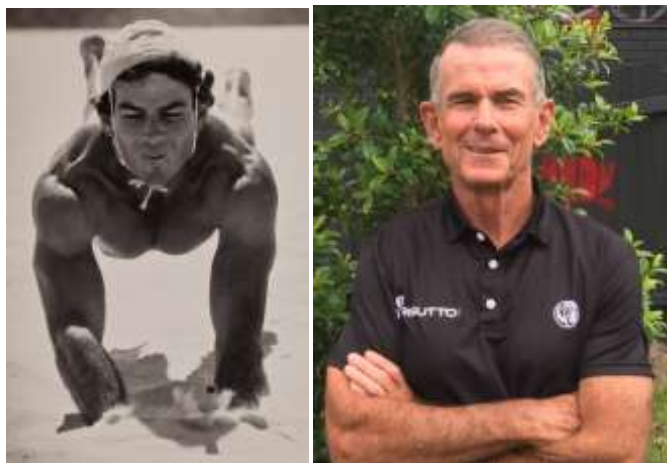
Originally from the Freshwater Club in NSW, Rob transferred to the Leighton SLSC in 1976. He won the WA State Championship that year and went on to win his third Australian Beach Flags Championship at Clifton Beach, Tasmania.

As well as being a champion competitor, Rob was an outstanding club person. He was Club Vice-Captain in 1979-80 and Club Captain for four years from 1980 to 1984. In those days, the Club Captain was the single most important officer in the Club, being in charge of all lifesaving, competitive and junior activities.

Known as the "Super Coach", Rob also coached the Fremantle beach team from 1979 to 1984 with great success and laid the foundation for Fremantle's beach sprint and beach relay dominance over the next decade.

Rob's individual induction to the Sporting Hall of Fame follows his team induction last year as inaugural coach of the Fremantle Beach Relay team 1981-1992.

Director of Surf Sports Report

The 2017-18 competition season - a Hometown Aussies season - has been one of steady improvement and consolidation, driven by the arrival of our gun Nippers and Youth into senior club.

The season kicked off with the Pool Rescue Competition with Fremantle finishing fourth overall on 478pts. By age classifications, our Nippers won their competition, the Masters team came second and the Open team finished fourth. Our Youth members, Harrison Hynes and TJ Chong Sue, represented both our Club and WA at the National/Interstates Pool Rescue Titles in Adelaide, combining to win a number of Interstates relay events (helping WA to finish third overall). In the Club-based competition, they continued to win golds and smash Australian records resulting in Fremantle finishing in 12th place overall, based on just these two competitors' performances - an outstanding result. So good was TJ's performance, he was selected in the Australian Youth Team for Pool Rescue Worlds!

Fremantle has a rich history in IRB Racing, winning seven of the last eight State Championships. This season saw Mullaloo set the pace, winning the first three rounds from us, until we finally nailed them in the final round. However, at State Championships with Mullaloo won convincingly with 64pts from Fremantle and Scarborough tied for second on 46pts. Robust competition is a good thing and this will help steel the resolve of the IRB group to bounce back stronger than ever in 2018-19.

The pre-season Winter Surf Series of previous years was abandoned by SLSWA in favour of the new Surf League format - an 'elite' competition with male and female teams of 10 competitors each including a surf boat crew. Fremantle fielded a team filled with Youth competitors and this provided a great opportunity to blood these youngsters in Senior competition. We contested two of the three events. The new format could use some tinkering, but is a way more interesting way to begin the season. To maintain interest from the smaller clubs, SLSWA should restrict teams to one per club. I think the introduction of mixed male and female team events is a great initiative and this should extend into Sunsmart Carnivals and State Championships.

November saw the running of the State Endurance Championships and in a tight contest Fremantle finished sixth, with only 3pts separating fourth to sixth.

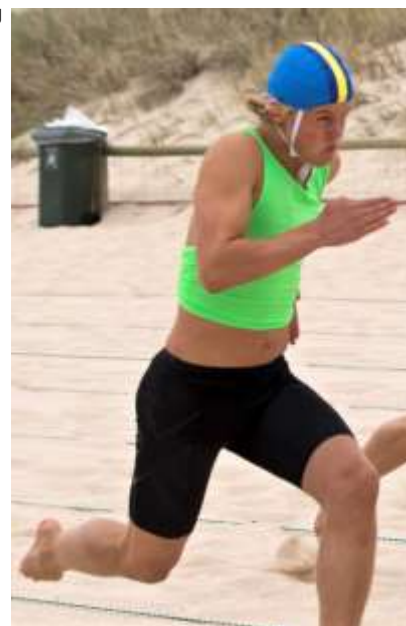
The summer season, comprising five Sunsmart Carnivals, was kicked off with the first being hosted super-successfully at Leighton.

The Masters State Championships saw our biggest ever group of motivated mature competitors take on the other WA clubs at Sorrento, where we finished fifth on 276.5pts, an improvement on last year's great result. Across all the disciplines (pool rescue, board riding and surf), our impressive Masters group finished fourth on 405.5pts.

Some of the best quality surf in years greeted competitors at Scarborough Beach for the State Championships. A large NW-directed swell, offshore breeze and a low tide created the best 'lefthander' barrels I have ever seen at Scarborough. Carnage was inevitable with broken craft and even surf boats spiralling into the atmosphere. On the weekend, Fremantle finished sixth on 134pts, with three state titles won (Amelie Prinsloo in the U14 2km Beach Run, Zac Evans in the U14 Beach Sprint and Pat Dart in the U14M Board Race), eight silver medals and six bronze medals. Once again, our Youth competitors contributed the bulk of our points.

Whilst the Commonwealth Games this year were on the Gold Coast, 'The Big Show' - Aussies 2018 - was hosted at Scarborough Beach. We reportedly had 83 competitors registered, probably a record for the Club. The Youth group kicked it off and results poured in with multiple qualifications for Aussies Finals. Amelie Prinsloo won a bronze medal in the U14 2km Beach Run, continuing our success in this event. From memory, we have won two silvers and two bronze

medals in this event since 2012. Overall, our Youth Group scored 7pts. Next up was Aussies Masters and we fielded a large enthusiastic group of competitors, who out-did themselves with scoring 45pts to finish 31st of all clubs competing. No National titles this year, but we made up for it in numbers of medals - David Carbon won a silver in 45-49yr Beach Flags, Jack Dowie bronze in 55-59yrs 2km Beach Run,

and Fiona Carroll, Tracey Shaw and Pip Hawson bronze in the 150+yrs Female Surf Race. Several fourths and fifths showed how close we came in many events. We are still rebuilding our young Opens group, who will benefit from Youth competitors coming into their age groups next season. I am led to believe Aussies is back at Broadbeach (Kurrawa) in 2019; an interesting decision by SLSA. I am hoping we can field our largest touring team yet, so make sure you start training early in winter so you hit next season ready for action.

I would like to thank the following people for the hours of selfless assistance and support they give our athletes. The biggest thank you goes to Mike Shaw who has been the Surf Sports Manager this season. With my heavy work commitments this season I have had to rely on Mike running a tight ship and keeping it on course. Jo Jameson, Erin and Dee are thanked for the thankless task of getting carnival entries done. And a special thanks goes to John Summers, Kitty Eichner and the IRB group for organising and setting up the cans for our Club Champs and Club Trophy Events through the season.

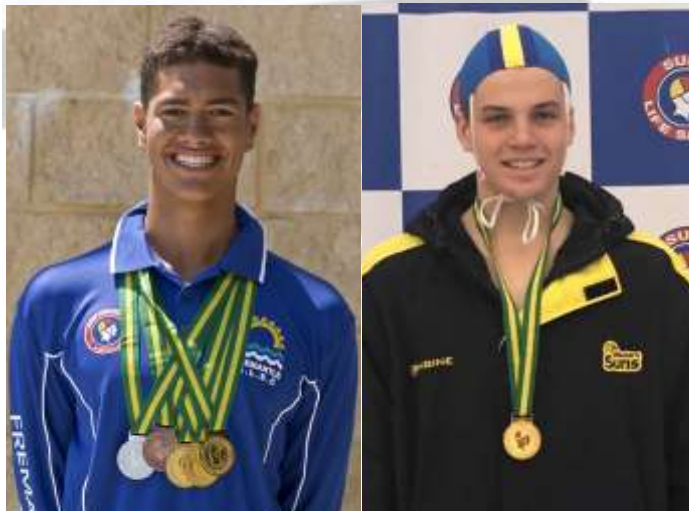


Fremantle Masters 'beachies' at Aussies 2018 Scarborough

Fremantle young stars shine in National competition

At Fremantle, we have an outstanding cadre of young competitors who have not only performed well in our surf State Championships, but in 2017-18 have gone on to shine in competitions at National level – both within and outside of surf life saving.

In August, Harrison Hynes and TJ Chong Sue competed in the

Australian Surf Life Saving Pool Rescue Championships in Adelaide. As part of the WA team competing in the Interstates competition, Harrison and TJ teamed up to win two first places in the 13/14 years 4 x 25m Manikin Relay and the 4 x 50m Medley Relay; in the latter setting a new Australian record. Then, individually representing Fremantle, TJ won three gold and one silver medal, with Harrison bringing home two gold medals. And between them, they set three new Australian records.

In December, TJ Chong Sue, Pat Dart and Ellie Fry were selected in the Western Suns State Youth Development Squad – which gave them the opportunity to go over east and compete in the Manly and Freshwater surf carnivals over the Australia Day weekend. Unfortunately, TJ and Ellie weren't available that weekend, but Pat had a great time, coming sixth in boards, ninth in the surf race and tenth in ironman, and was the first WA competitor over the line each time !

Next, in January, Ellie Fry and Olivia Power competed in the Australian Open Water Swimming Championships held at Adelaide's

Brighton Beach. Ellie took the Bronze medal in the 14 years 5km swim with a time just under 66 minutes, while Olivia ranked fifteenth in the 16 years 5km swim with a time of 67 minutes.

Also, in January, TJ Chong Sue and Harrison Hynes competed at the Royal Life Saving Pool Championships in Adelaide, and achieved some amazing results. As part of a small WA team, they help our State to third position overall. Individually, TJ came away with a bag of seven gold, two silver and three bronze medals, while Harrison snagged four gold, four silver and two bronze medals. In doing so, Harrison and TJ set two new Australian records. Overall, in the Under 16 years age group, TJ and Harrison placed first and fourth respectively. By the end of the competition, TJ was named the Male Life Saver of the Championships, and both Harrison and TJ were named in the Junior Australian Barras squad.

Most recently in April, club members Vienne Seneque, Ellie Fry, Amelie Prinsloo, Harrison Hynes and TJ Chong Sue competed at the 2018 Georgina Hope Foundation Australian Age Swimming Championships in Sydney. Both Ellie and Amelie made finals but TJ Chong Sue had an outstanding carnival which saw him bring home eight gold medals (six individual, two relay) and two new Australian age records in the 14 years division.

Last of all, TJ Chong Sue's results this season have seen him nominated in three categories at the 2018 Westpac Swimmer of the Year Awards held in May 2018. TJ's was nominated for –

The Frank Osman Memorial Shield (for 13 year old swimmers, either male or female, over the duration of the Australian Age Championships);

The Bob Bestman Trophy (for swimmers who in the opinion of the Selection Committee return the most outstanding swim by a WA swimmer at the Australian Age Championships.);

... before eventual winning the Bob Bestman Trophy—what a great achievement !

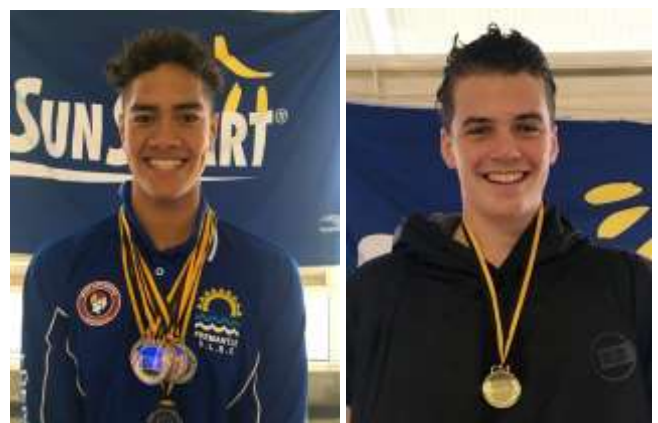
