remantle Surf Life Saving Club's 2020 season was proving to be Surf sports performance coaching was re-introduced this season and outbreak of COVID-19 and drastic actions were needed. Despite this, our club closed in March 2020 in a positive frame of mind, knowing our membership and staff were healthy and technology was available to keep everyone informed and in touch.

The closure of the Club gave the management and administration teams a chance to step back and do a reset on systems and processes in readiness for the coming season. Most importantly, the closure brought out the best in our membership and staff allowing us to realise that what our club does as a community is very rewarding. Members were communicating online, participating in virtual training and having fun, as well as showing care and support for each other. Our Club's peer support group was and continues to be available to

We congratulate every member who achieved something this season, whether in competition and peaking for or placing in an event, earning a lifesaving award or receiving a smile from someone who you may have helped in some way.

To all our members and of course our valuable administration staff, the club thanks you for everything you do! We are a club who lives by and is proud of its values and you are the people who continue make it happen. In short, Freo is an awesome club!

Financial Viability

Our Club is healthy, as expenditure was lower than budgeted primarily due to the early closure. Recent sponsorship, including that from Woodside, relieved the club of ongoing operational costs. Unexpected capex costs, such as the recently replaced security system, are inevitable, but contingency budgeting was available.

Sponsorship this season took a hit with the loss of a few sponsors. However, those new incoming sponsors are a welcome sign that support within our community is available. From this experience, our Club will concentrate on developing and maintaining a formal marketing strategy in the coming season.

Participation

This season, our Club focused on all members having the opportunity to participate or, at least have a go in, all activities and events. From this we saw high Youth retention and the return of our Club's older Masters, some of whom enjoyed activities and mentoring opportunities with the Nippers and Youth. Nipper parents are also tending to volunteer more, relieving Age Group Managers of stress from their large and vital volunteer role. Some of this may also have been attributed to the Woodside Nippers sponsorship package and the availability of new equipment.

Member Development

Member development has continued improve across all areas. Lifesaving and education trainers and assessors had very large numbers in both new award training and the early season patrol award re-qualifications (299 proficient Bronze Medallion members).

Our Club continued to be a top 'training' club, with 61 Bronze Medallion, 58 Youth and 26 adult Surf Rescue Certificate and 43 higher awards gained this season.

Despite the State Championships and Aussies being cancelled, the work was beneficial for everyone involved. Performance coaching opportunities will increase again in the coming season.

Sustainability

This season our club exceeded a membership of 1,550 inclusive of 574 Nippers and 215 Youth, proving our membership is stable and youth retention is good.

Our reputation as a Club who 'saves lives and builds a better communities' stands strong. Feedback from our members and community stakeholders has been positive. Despite this positive outcome, the Club will continue to consolidate, refine and strive for excellence.

Engagement

Engaging within our membership, with staff and third parties is something we do well. This season, we had direct involvement with the public right through to state and local government, reinforcing our Club and its members' importance.



Acknowledgement of the Country

Fremantle Surf Life Saving Club acknowledges the Whadjuk people of the Nyoongar nation on whose traditional lands and waterways we serve our community, and we have deep respect for their elder's past, present and emerging. We recognise and seek to learn from the important knowledge held by First Nations people over tens of thousands of years as the traditional custodians of Walyalup.

This season, Reconciliation was formally recognised as an important responsible action for our club to plan and work towards. In April 2020 the club announced its intent and ongoing actions to continuously build relationships, respect and trust between the wider Australian community and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

Our inaugural Reconciliation Acton Plan (RAP) will underpin our early steps toward reconciliation. The first of four levels in the RAP framework is Reflect. The Reflect level plan sets out the steps our club will take to prepare for and commit to. Our commitment to the Reflect RAP will assist us to acknowledge and develop increasingly meaningful relationships with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander members and stakeholders within the local community whom we serve. This important initial step will also assist us to shape our vision for reconciliation before committing to specific actions or initiatives. This process will help inform our future planning in a meaningful, collaborative, mutually beneficial and sustainable way.

We are excited about the prospects of our Reconciliation Action Plan outcomes and also for future collaborations with other clubs as we work towards a future of embedded cultural knowledge, understanding and value. Going forward you will see and hear announcements relating to the commencement of our journey; including the introduction of educational programs, fun activities and of course our connections with the wider community.

Lifesaver of the Year (Kieren Smith, finalist)

Kieren is an IRB and jet ski driver on patrol, a member of the Wesfarmers Emergency Response Team, and the Club's drone and radio equipment officer. Kieren regularly provides water safety for SLSWA carnivals, Abalone Patrol as well as our own Fremantle Ocean Classic swim. He is also a key member of our IRB racing team.



Youth Lifesaver of the Year (Luke de Laeter)

Luke has been an outstanding Club member and contributor all season. This season Luke has been the designated IRB Crew Person on his rostered 'Bubbles' patrol and volunteered his time as an IRB Driver and Crew Person on a number of other patrols when they were short. He gained his IRB Driver qualification and WA Drone Patrol Operator qualification, wherein Luke became our Club's



youngest drone operator. Luke is always around the club to lend a helping hand including setting up carnivals, assisting the nipper program, providing water safety for the Fremantle Ocean Classic IRB racing competitor as a crew person and driver and has been a Legal Club of the Year award, and Youth Athlete of the Year! great role model and asset to our Club.

Coach of the Year (Craig Ashworth, finalist)

Whilst always having been passionate about Surf Sports and coaching, this season, Craig took on the Surf Sports Manager role and began working with athletes to understand what they wanted from a training program. He turned this into a Coaching Framework for Board and Iron disciplines (to align with the SLSA framework). He also was our Performance Boards Coach.

Youth Athlete of the Year (Harrison Hynes, finalist)

Harrison had an outstanding year in the pool, winning six gold, one silver and one bronze at the State Pool Rescue Championships followed by one gold, one silver and one bronze at the Australian Pool Rescue Championships. While competing there for WA in Interstates, he picked up three firsts and a third. Harrison was rewarded by being selected in



the Australian Youth Life Saving team, which were meant to compete at the 2020 Life saving World Championships in Italy.

Trainer of the Year (Cath Morgan, finalist)

Cath has been our Club's SRC training coordinator for a number of years. This year, Cath not only delivered 40 hours of training directly to the Youth SRC group, she ran an Adult SRC course in parallel, delivering 26 new adult water safety people for the Nippers. In her downtime, Cath also delivered several Bronze training sessions.



Community Program of the Year (finalist)

In its sixth year, this program, run by Matt Elliott and Mike Shaw, hosted over 60 students from Aranmore Catholic College and Lynwood SHS - recent immigrants to Australia. Many have never seen the ocean, or have limited awareness of the dangers of the



surf. We presented in-class sessions followed by on-beach activities to promote safety and awareness of the role of surf lifesavers. Our philosophy is that it is better to prevent the problem through awareness, than to make the rescue. The students are then able to pass that knowledge to their parents.

Support Operations Volunteer of the Year (Kieren Smith, finalist)

Kieren was nominated by SLSWA for his outstanding contributions to the Wesfarmers ERT, Abalone Patrol and Drone program.

Director of Finance Report

am pleased to present the Audited Financial Report for the L twelve month period ended 31 March 2020.

Result for the year

The Club has recorded a net profit of \$103,997 for the year after amortisation, depreciation and accounting adjustments, but before capital expenditure.

The net profit prior to the accounting adjustments mentioned above was \$ 100,176.

Whilst the result for the year was very pleasing given the early end to our season due to the COVID-19 pandemic, revenue such as bar, canteen and uniform shop sales and club venue hire were reduced due to this early closure. The financial effects on the club due to the early closure to the season were mainly offset by income received Looking forward via the Federal Government stimulus package of \$10,000 and support from SLSWA in not charging the club for members insurance for the year, a saving of approximately \$25,000.

Statement of financial position

As at 31 March 2020 the Club's net assets were valued at \$2,179,468.

The Club's cash assets amounted to \$350,583 as at 31 March 2020.

The year ahead presents an interesting challenge for the club, due to the uncertainty relating to COVID-19. Whilst there may be some negative impact on some of our revenue (membership, sponsorship, club hire and rental) during the year, this should be mainly offset from Federal Government support received by the club in the form of the cash boost and Jobkeeper schemes. Our current budgeting forecasts a surplus for the year, and even with an extensive amount being spent on capital equipment, we still anticipate a small surplus. We are aware that things can change very quickly and we continue to regularly monitor the clubs financial position to ensure we can react quickly to any changes..

I would like to thank all of our members who donate their time, expertise and goods to the club, whilst this may not be reflected in the financial accounts of the club, your contribution is invaluable as it frees up our cash resources to be used providing members equipment and services.

Finally I would also like to thank our administration staff Jo, Dee and Toby, their knowledge and support throughout the year is very much appreciated.

New Life Member - Nick Palmer



Nick Palmer ("Napalm") joined the Club in November 1986 along with his brother Bill. Steve "Pom" Connor enticed them both to join his crew. which. made the finals in 1990. The crew went on the win the first gold medal for the Club in Open Surf Boats in 1991. Nick continued to row in top competition until family and work commitments lured him away in 1998. He rejoined in 2000 and a few years later saw a need for some direction and guidance when the competition arena was not developing as it could have.

To build a positive culture in the surf boats, Nick's philosophy has been to develop and nurture the young people in the Club and to promote rowing to young members by means of fitness training, good coaching, and camaraderie with other members, and having fun, which hopefully will lead to better community and corporate citizens. In 2007, he took over the role of surf boat captain in 2007-08 which he still holds after 10 years.

Nick's contribution to surf boats and Club activities saw him nominated as Best Club Member in 2017-18.

Nick has continued with his goals of development of crews and sweeps. He vigorously pursued funding from the Board for training programs, organised coaches for fitness and weight training for rowers in pre-season, and sourced and coerced a specialist rowing coach.

Because of his persistence and good nature, he has been successful in attracting sponsorship for two surfboats, three sets of oars and three rowing machines which meant club funds could be redirected.

Sweeps are hard to find, develop and retain, but Nick has managed to do just that and guided sweeps to become qualified as coaches under rigorous conditions. Nick had mentored sweeps from Coogee Surf Club with the result that one of them joined our Club and has successfully developed young rowers.

Nick's interest is surf club, his passion is surf boats and the development of his sons and those around them to make the most of opportunities presented to them. He has a vision to develop a rowing fraternity from within Club ranks to build a culture around surf boat rowing that would encourage young people to develop and maintain a long term relationship with the club.



Vale Ivan 'Pip' Anderton (Life Member)

Ivan, or "Pip" as he was known, joined the Leighton Surf Club as a 15 year old Junior in December 1944. He took on the positions of Ambulance Officer and Social Director in the 1949-50 season and from 1947 he instructed numerous candidates for the SLSA Awards. In July 1950, he joined the WA Board of Examiners. As an SLSWA Board Member, Pip served a distinguished term as an Examiner, Carnival Referee and Judge.

From the late 1940's to early 50's, the Leighton Surf Club was in dire straits due to low membership and Pip was one of a small group, including Dave Blackley, Bill Summers and Don Pass who kept the club functioning. He was named Best Club Member in 1951, midway through a three year term as Club Secretary. In the 1951-52 season, Pip was also Ambulance Officer on the Lifesaving Committee and Coach of the Senior Rescue and Resuscitation team





Pip is recognized mostly for his tenure as Club Treasurer for 11 years from 1956 to 1969, and again in the 1979-80 season. He presided over the club finances during the volatile times when the club had low membership, was under threat of resumption of Leighton Beach in 1958 and the change from old to new clubrooms in 1962. He provided the club with advice on insurance requirements and information on its financial problems. In 1965, the club's funds were overdrawn and Pip was a member of the sub-committee to review the problem. As part of the solution to the problem he organized a fund-raising display in the clubrooms featuring a shark caught by Frank Miragliotta.

For his dedication to the club's administrative affairs Pip was awarded Life Membership in August 1961. He was tenacious with management matters, never letting any business go unfinished. He was also a fountain of knowledge on the Club Constitution and By-Laws, ensuring all members stuck to the rules.

Pip got onto the beach occasionally as Patrol Officer in 1965-66. He was Club President for three years from 1969 to 1972 and Vice-President for three years between 1972 and 1976. In 1970, he set up a Building Sub-Committee to investigate the offer of land by the Mosman Town Council to relocate the Clubrooms. The Committee decided to remain at the present site and improve the premises in three stages. In 1975-76, Pip assisted Ron Bennett in the Club's Aquavival course, giving community instruction on resuscitation methods.

Pip received Life Membership of Surf Lifesaving WA in 1975.

Pip sadly passed away in June 2020, aged 91 years.

HMAS Sydney II Memorial

ach Year in November, our Club holds a special ceremony to $oldsymbol{\mathbb{L}}$ remember the officers and crew of the HMAS Sydney II, which was lost on November 19th 1941 with all 645 crew members in an epic sea battle with the German raider 'Kormoran'. We hold the ceremony on Leighton Beach in front of our assembled nippers, parents and seniors, and recall that many of the crew of HMAS Sydney II spent time at Leighton and our surf club when not on active duty. In February 1941, the crew of HMAS Sydney II presented our club with a hand-made reel, which in the day was the prime means of rescuing people from the surf. The reel is displayed each year and plays a central part in the ceremony.

This year, attendees to the memorial service included Captain Ainsley Morthorpe of the Royal Australian Navy based at HMAS Stirling, Councillor Doug Thompson representing the City of Fremantle, John McCourt, CEO of the RSL WA, Port Beach Polar

Afterwards, all attendees and guests gathered for a morning tea.

The 'Fremantle Ocean Classic'



The Fremantle Ocean Classic is now in its third year in the current • format, and continues to improve year on year. This year, we dropped the board and beach options from last year, and focussed on the key swimming events. We also added few more swimming events to cater for the widest possible range of preferences adding in an elite 6400m swim, plus a couple of short swims and It was really pleasing to see some of our Club members - the three wades for the kiddies! Over the three major swim distances, we attracted a very pleasing 240 competitors, up 30% over last year.





It has been a great season, with much training by all members throughout the club, plenty of action on Sunday mornings with nippers, planning and development for the future of the club. This has included several serious first aid incidents and rescues, and the feedback from both on and off the beach has been very complimentary of the treatment we have provided.

In true Fremantle form, during the season we have continued to provide great opportunities for our members to further improve their skills and capabilities. They don't get much press, but it wouldn't be except for the incredible work and dedication by our trainers and assessors. The club would definitely not be at the standard we are today without their skills and knowledge. As a result of their efforts, this season we have conducted three Bronze Courses and two SRC Courses and gained 61 new Bronze Medallion and 83 new SRC award holders.

It was especially pleasing to two new trainers - Lawson Mills and Spencer Cranston participate in the Bronze courses and ultimately get their WA your support!

Trainers Certificate. It will be an objective of the Education Committee this year to find more members to step up and become trainers and assessors, to take off some of the pressure from the current group.

Organisation of proficiencies (skills maintenance checks) continues to improve each year, and we followed the same approach as last year. One new feature is that SLSA have produced an app which allows proficiencies to be directly uploaded to Surfguard, without admin support and the generation of Form 14's. This is a significant reduction in the overhead of maintaining our qualification. Although there have been teething problems, both with the app and with members needing to have a Members Area account to book timeslot, it will ultimately work out to be a real time-saver for the Education Manager and Trainers.

7hile season 2019-20 was significantly disrupted due to the $\,$ We have settled into an ongoing program of three Bronze courses each season - one intensive one-week course in each of the September and January school holidays (which suits school students who have exams in the latter months of the school year) and a full eight-week course from October to December. Although we had very large numbers for the SRC group this year, Cath Morgan elected (as SRC coordinator) not to break up the group into a number of smaller courses, but to maintain team cohesion and run a single group. This took a massive effort from the trainers, but they pulled it off handsomely!

> A future change to the Bronze Medallion is that the course content will no longer contain oxygen delivery - instead, a member will have to hold the Advanced Resuscitation Techniques (ART) award to do this. The implication on our life saving services is that we will now need to deliver many more ART award holder to ensure coverage on our patrols. Plans are underway to incorporate this in our training calendar.

> We continue to deliver high quality commercial first aid and surf rescue training, through John Summers, John Price, Peter Hastie, Holly Casey, Leanne Coverley-Brandis and myself. Holly is a club member and previously used to run much of the Surf Rescue Certificate training for schools through SLSWA, but now does it through our Club. We ran four SRC and two First Aid courses covering 99 candidates and generated several thousand dollars in fees for the Club.

> IRB and jet ski training in 2019 missed out on all the Covid-19 problems and our tireless trainers delivered nine IRB Crew, nine IRB drivers and five RWC (jet ski) drivers to support our lifesaving operations.

> The highlight of the year was undoubted the recognition of our Multicultural Beach and Surf Safety program for the SLSWA Community Program of the Year. The program, run by Matt Elliott and myself, provides in-school learning and beach excursions to two schools (Aranmore Catholic College and Lynwood SHS) for many kids who have never seen the ocean. Our philosophy is to educate kids (and their parents) to avoid having to make rescues.

> Again, my great thanks to everyone who has contributed to the training of our members - we would not be able to do this without

Marketing Report

I hope that from your involvement this year, you have felt the benefit of being involved in a Community Club, contributing to the Community whilst having fun so doing. Further, I hope that you have felt through your involvement your skills and fitness have been enhanced, and your friendship groups enlarged. If this is the case, then I feel encouraged that the Management Committee of Youth has achieves its aims.

In total, we had 223 Youth sign up for a season of fun, fitness and learning, and for much of the season that's the way it was. But as we built up to the crescendo at the back end of the season, we were all sent home to bunker down amid the Coronavirus doom.

left all members of our club disappointed. However, on a positive note, the quick response of government and the cooperation of the public averted a health catastrophe. As I write this report, the restrictions are easing and we are slowly heading back to the new normall

So, in an abbreviated season, what happened? As always, the season kicked off with the Pool Rescue Competition, a discipline which Fremantle excels, and a regular top-three contender. This season was no different, pushing Trigg all the way to the finish, and coming second on 584.5pts gaining 30 State Titles, 33 Silver medals and 29 Bronze medals across the age groups. Top individual points were earned by Harrison Hynes (36) and Phoebe Ashworth (31) in Youth and Opens, respectively, and Peter Traeger (26) and Tracey Shaw (18) in Masters. Such magnificent results earnt Western Suns representation for Phoebe Ashworth, Harrison Hynes, Alison Webb, TJ Chong Sue, Archie Davis and Kelton Rothnie. Pool Rescue Aussies were hosted by the Gold Coast and Fremantle did exceptionally well, finishing 9th out of 29 clubs in Youth-Open Males, 20th out of 32 clubs in Youth-Open Females and 12th out of 22 clubs in Masters. Harrison Hynes won a National Title in Youth 50m with Fins, in a time faster than the Open Men's final. In addition to this National Title, we came home with 3 Silver medals and 3 Bronze medals. Congratulations to all the competitors and coaches for yet another highly successful Pool Rescue campaign.

Leighton Beach was host to the opening round of the IRB Racing Season and Mullaloo continued their fine form from last season. State Championships were little different with Mullaloo winning the Title by a country mile and Fremantle edged out by runners-up Scarboro by just 1 point.

In the Endurance State Champs, a small team brought home 3 State Titles, 5 silvers and 3 Bronze medals.

It continues to prove challenging to get decent numbers of older Youth and Open members competing over the busy calendar presented by SLSWA. This has resulted in Fremantle relying upon a core group of elite level youngsters to represent the Club and these kids have done a fantastic job lining up against Senior competitors almost twice their age in Surf League and team events at Sunsmart carnivals. Reinvigorating participation in senior competition must be a priority for the next Committee.

The COVID-19 pandemic and government restrictions brought. In contrast, the Surf Boat Rowers have gone from strength to the 2019-20 season to a sudden and premature end, that has strength this season with good numbers of crews training and culminating in an outstanding Gold Medal row by the 'Mad Fish' U19 male crew at the Short Course Championships at Albany. This race was pretty much the last State title run before the cancellation of the season, so we finished on a high, and spectating at this race was definitely the highlight of the season for me.

Masters States, held at Ocean Beach Denmark, was really the only successfully completed Summer State Titles, and only in the 'knick of time' as the weather turned nasty the following day. Top marks to SLSWA for choosing a fantastic venue and I can personally vouch for how much the grey-haired folk enjoyed it. Fremantle Masters has such a strong team culture and vibe and we did the club proud finishing 4th out of the 21 clubs present. Our haul included 13 Golds, 9 Silver and 4 Bronze medals.

I wish to thank all the competitors for putting in the hard work at training and representing your Club at Carnivals and State and National Titles. The setbacks this year will make you hungrier for success next season. On behalf of the Surf Sports Committee and competitors and the Club I would like to thank our Club Coaches for the many hours spent working on training programs, guiding. motivating and keeping our athletes focussed throughout a long pre-season and early competitions. I thank our officials and those

> members who signed on for first aid and water safety rosters quaranteeing the athletes race. thank а administrative team for efficiently carnival entries in background. And finally a big thank you to my committee and in particularly Craig 'Ashie' Ashworth for taking on the massive workload of Surf Sports Manager, as well as coaching boards and pool rescue - a Herculean effort.

This is my last season as Director of Surf Sports and I wish the incoming Director and the new Surf Sports committee well for the challenges ahead.

The report, except for the cash flow information, has been prepared on an accruals basis in that it accounts for debtors, creditors, employee provisions and prepaid building lease income, but has not included other accruals and prepayments in order to be consistent with year accounting treatment. The report is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values, or except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following material accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

(a) Income tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the association is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

(b) Property, plant and equipment

Property

Freehold land and buildings are measured at their fair value (being the amount for which an asset could be exchanged between knowledgeable willing parties in an arm's length transaction), based on periodic, but at least triennial, valuations by external independent valuers, less subsequent depreciation for buildings.

Increases in the carrying amount arising on revaluation of land and buildings are credited to a revaluation surplus in equity. Decreases that offset previous increases of the same asset are charged against fair value reserves directly in equity. Decreases that offset previous increases of the same asset are charged against fair value reserves directly in equity; all other decreases are charged to the statement of comprehensive income.

Any accumulated depreciation at the date of revaluation is eliminated against the gross carrying amount of the asset and the net amount is restated to the revalued amount of the asset.

Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by the committee to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount of those assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows which will be received from the assets' employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have not been discounted to their present values determining recovering amounts.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets, excluding land and buildings, are depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset was held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease of the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

(c) Cash on hand

Cash on hand included cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

(d) Accounts receivable and other debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors includes amounts due from customers. Receivable expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivable are classified as non-current assets.

(e) Revenue and other income

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

If conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

Cash receipts are recognised as income when they are deposited into the bank account

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

(f) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australia Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

(g) Accounts payable and other payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days or recognition of the liability.

Note 1: Statement of significant accounting policies continued

(h) Employee provisions

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee provisions have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled

(i) Leases

Leases of PPE, where substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset (but not the legal ownership) are transferred to the association, are classified as finance leases.

Finance leases are capitalised by recording an asset and a liability at the lower of the amounts equal to the fair value of the leased property or the present value of the minimum lease payments, including any guaranteed residual values. Lease payments are allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for that period

Leased assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter of their estimated useful lives or the lease term. Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses in the periods in which they are incurred

(j) Impairment of assets

At the end of each reporting period, the committee reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value in use, to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised in the income and expenditure statement

(k) Inventories on hand

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost or net realisable value.

(I) Change of accounting period

It should be noted that the Club changed its financial year end to 31 March as per a resolution passed at the Annual General Meeting in June 2018. Therefore the figures to 31 March 2020 are for a twelve month period, the comparative figures for 2019 are for an eleven month period.

Receipts from Bar, Canteen, Merchandise and other cash fundraising activities are a source of revenue for the Club. The Club has determined that it is impracticable to establish control over the collection of this fundraising revenue prior to entry in its financial records. Accordingly, as the evidence available to me about revenue from these sources was limited, my audit procedures for these aforementioned fundraising activities had to be restricted to the amounts recorded in the financial records. I therefore am unable to express an opinion on whether this aforementioned fundraising cash revenue obtained by the Club is complete.

Qualified opinion

In my opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, the financial report of the Fremantle Surf Life Saving Club Inc. presents fairly in all material respects in accordance with the accounting policies described in Note 1 to the financial statements, the financial position of the Club at 31st March 2020 and its financial performance and its cash flows for the twelve months then ended.

Emphasis of matter

I draw attention to Note 1(e) in the financial report which describes the revenue recognition policy of the Club including the limitations that exist in relation to the recording of cash receipts from cash sales, donations and other cash fundraising activities. Revenue from this source represents a sizeable proportion of the Club's revenue. My opinion is unmodified in respect of this matter.
