President's Report

The 2021-22 season started with a blast at the SLSWA Awards of Excellence, where Fremantle won (for the third time in six years) Patrol Club of the Year and placed third for Lavan Club of the Year, and Jay Morgan received an outstanding acknowledgement as Lifesaver of the Year. Nominations for this year's awards have been submitted and we are excited to have been accepted as Finalists in the following categories -

- Lavan Club of the Year (Reg Trigg OBE, Memorial Trophy)
- Patrol Club of the Year (IT Birtwistle Trophy)
- Youth Lifesaver of the Year - Jake Silipo
- Young Volunteer of the Year - James Currey
- Assessor of the Year - Mike Shaw
- Support Operations Volunteer of the Year - John Summers

Our Club, incorporating 1614 members, continues to be supported by the four Pillars of Surf Life Saving. - Life saving; Education and Training; Surf Sports and Nipper and Youth Development. These pillars would collapse if it wasn't for our volunteer members, our administration staff and management teams at all levels. Without the involvement of everyone in the Club, we cannot imagine the impact it would have on the Club itself and the community. On behalf of the Club, I thank you all.

Life Saving

Our Club's Vision is "To develop surf life savers for life".

Between October and April this season, beach attendance was just under 126,000 (up from 104,000 last year), which supported our assumptions that the growth in facilities nearby is contributing to increased beach attendance.

First aid injuries were lower this season with marine stingers being much less apparent. Preventative actions rose sharply from last season, most of which were related to shark sightings.

The tragic shark attack at Port Beach in November is an event now etched in the minds of many at the Club and, of course, the community. Despite the outcome being a fatality, the Club and all third parties involved including the family of the late Paul Millachip, have embraced the learning from the event to ensure readiness and equipment for major events are properly in place. For us, this has involved upskilling our Patrol Captains and Vice Captains in the areas of managing a critical incident, communication, hands-off leadership, working closely with external agencies and member care.

Life saving is why we are here, so thank you to everyone on the beach and back of beach for doing the hard yards as volunteers.

To deliver life saving services effectively, the combination of the other three Pillars - Education and Training; Surf Sports and Nipper and Youth Development - are fundamental to developing great life savers.

From Under 6 to Masters, we continue to learn and train within the four Pillars and, most importantly, we need to have fun and enjoy being life savers.

Financial Viability

Our Club is financially healthy. Expenditure this year was lower, but the global increase in prices for operational and maintenance expenses did show up as higher than expected. Budgeting for the coming season will incorporate these increased costs, despite the impact this season not being significant. The Club is reliant on

sponsorship as well as income from membership fees, so careful planning will continue for foreseeable seasons.

Sponsorship is stable mainly through the receipt of a new major sponsor topping up the shortfall of existing smaller sponsors who could not be financially supportive this season. In the coming season, the Club will require strategic input into its marketing plan to ensure support continues.

Participation

Member participation, at all ages and for all Club events, continues to be a priority focus for the Club. The recognised lack in participation in Surf Sports activities last season improved significantly during this season, showing the rebuild of the Surf Sports Pillar is coming to fruition.

We commonly see members participating in operational roles out on the beach. However, it's those behind the scenes that we also need to recognise more and to whom we need to offer assistance - uniform store, canteen, trainers, assessors, committee members and managers to name a few. It is important these people have time for fun in the sun with family and friends this coming season, so please put up your hand to offer your support, even if it is just occasionally.

Member Development

The Woodside Nippers Program continued to boost enthusiasm within our Nipper group. Nipper numbers remained consistently high, and capping of age groups was returned for management, operational and safety reasons. To support our Age Group Managers through their tenure, we introduced a compulsory annual Age Group Manager training program. This program was designed to support the education and development of our Age Group Managers and ensure their coaching techniques are consistent with the SLSWA curriculum across all age groups, with the most modern practices in human movement and physiology.

For the second year, our Club conducted a joint training day with St John's trainee paramedics. Our Education team developed a day-long program of ten testing first aid scenarios for over thirty Paramedic trainees, covering incidents that paramedics are likely to encounter at our beaches. Patients and First Responders were provided by our Patrol leadership team, which also gave our leaders valuable training in how to manage an incident on the beach and to coordinate, hand over and work cooperatively with the paramedics. St John are extremely happy with the program and are enthusiastic to continue the relationship with us.

Youth are continually encouraged and are willing to take senior patrol positions supported by a mentor scheme, such as Patrol Captain (supported by a senior Vice Captain). Youth enthusiastically put their hands up for Age Group Manager, Coaching and back of beach roles to support the Club. The Starfish Nippers program, being in its second year, adds another dimension to our Youth members' development, who work one-on-one with young people with special needs.

Sustainability

The Club has seen a 3.9% increase in membership since last season. Despite Nipper memberships being capped, the Club continues to grow in the broader membership areas, especially social. Based on this increase, we forecast more growth in the coming years through continually building relationships within the community and the increased media coverage through Surf Life Saving WA.

Our reputation as a Surf Life Saving Club remains strong. Outcomes year to year continue to be positive. However, the Club will always be prepared to react to a downturn should this be necessary.

Engagement

The Club continued its Multicultural Beach Safety and Surf Awareness program for an eighth year. This year, despite COVID difficulties and the after-effects of the Port Beach shark attack, our Club again hosted Aranmore Catholic College and Lynwood Senior High School's migrant units. A record total of 120 students received in-class presentations on beach safety and surf awareness before coming down to the beach for practical learning and fun.

Key stakeholders in the Port and Leighton Planning Group, initiated in 2021 and chaired by the Club, continue to improve collaboration to identify immediate and long-term issues at a management level. The group, inclusive of local government, the City of Fremantle and the Fremantle Port Authority, now meets at least quarterly, or when necessary, to manage issues before they escalate. Through this group, beach erosion mitigation has started at Port Beach, including rock wall construction/maintenance and the start of sand replenishment through sand dredging.

The Christmas Market was a massive hit this year, with a record number of stalls run by both members and the public. This will very likely become an exciting annual event on the Club calendar in future years.

The 80th anniversary of HMAS Sydney II Memorial drew a larger than normal attendance than seen in previous years. This emotional event is now well recognised within the community and with past servicemen.

For the second year, our Club ran its 'Pink Patrol' on March 7th, run entirely by our female members. Wearing pink on the patrol was a strong visual reminder to the beach-going public of the service of women in surf life saving, as well as highlighting societal issues. Attending members also collected women's toiletries for donation to women in need.

Best Club Member

This season, Cath Morgan was recognised as Best Club Member, for her outstanding contribution to Surf Sports Management and achievements at the Club.

Cath again worked hard all season in the frontline as well as behind the scenes, including 52 patrol hours, assisting in the education space with BM proficiencies and SRC training, helping with the Starfish Nippers program and organising the Club's first involvement in the national 24hr rowing event for mental health.

The Club prospers because of people like Cath who willingly give their time to help in whatever way they can.

Reconciliation



Kaya everyone,

Fremantle Surf Life Saving Club acknowledges the Whadjuk people of the Nyoongar nation, on whose traditional lands and waterways we serve our community, and we have deep respect for their Elders past, present and emerging. We recognise and seek to learn from the important knowledge held by First Nations Peoples over tens of thousands of years as the Traditional Custodians of Walyalup.

This season, we continued to work on our Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP), which was officially endorsed by Reconciliation Australia in 2021. The RAP Working Group put together a Terms of Reference document, which has been endorsed by the Club, outlining the role of the Working Group as well as how we will move forward in addressing the RAP.

The digitalised sand mural was used this season on the new boat "Happy As - Larry Tilbury". This imagery symbolises our Club's intent to promote and acknowledge First Nations People. We

further used this imagery on new youth tops. To celebrate the importance of the Sand Mural in the Club's Reconciliation journey, we had Roni and Simon Forrest join us and explain the meaning behind the sand mural art to the Youth as well as present the shirts individually to each youth member.

Brian joined the Leighton Club in 1973 as a Juvenile member (Nipper) and is one of the few to have spent a lifetime with this club. Brian has demonstrated leadership, has been involved in competition at the highest level and assisted club members in their development for nearly 50 years.

His leadership qualities became apparent early, being involved as Patrol Captain, Club Handicapper, Patrol Supervisor, Club Captain, Club Secretary, Club President and has continued to now as an Age Group Manager and Chairs of the Constitution Committee and of the History Committee.

In these roles, Brian has assisted in renegotiating the terms of the Club Patrol Contract with State Centre, developed a Lifesavers' Policy framework to delegate some of the responsibility of Club Captaincy, worked with the Club Directors to consolidate our Club Bar License and ensured that the Club Constitution was amended to fit the new structure of the Board.

Brian has been no slouch in the competition arena, raising attention on both the WA and eastern coasts as Junior and Senior Club Champion Lifesaver. He was recently installed in the WA Hall of

Fame as a member of the Fremantle Beach Relay Team from 1981 to 1992, a member of the State Team in 1981-82 and 1982-83 and possibly the crowning glory - the Pillow Fight Champion at the International Surf Carnival in 1983 - not many can claim that Title!

Brian has brought all this experience back into the Club as a coach and mentor to the younger members - as coach to the successful NSW Trophy Team, R and R Coach and Beach Sprint Coach.

It should be highlighted that Brian trained the first two female members at Fremantle to achieve the Bronze Medallion in 1980 (Carolyn Bailey and Debbie Bennett).

Brian's influence has extended to State Centre as a member of its Organisation Review Committee and Constitution Committee.

His most recent involvement in the Club, as Chair of the History Committee, is aimed at compiling a comprehensive history of the club in order to inspire our members in the future.

With more than 40 years of outstanding service to our Club and Surf Lifesaving WA, Brian is a shining example of the Club's Life Membership standards.

2022 SLSWA Awards of Excellence Nominees

At Fremantle, we have a proud history of providing exceptional nominees for the SLSWA Awards of Excellence, winning Patrol Club of the Year three times in the last six years, plus individual winners in the categories of Lifesaver, Trainer, Assessor and Volunteer of the Year in just the last three years alone. Congratulations to all of our nominees for the 2022 SLSWA Awards of Excellence!

Lavan Club of the Year (finalist)

Our Club has led the charge on several new initiatives this season. After the horrific shark attack in November, we upskilled our patrol leadership to give them better skills in critical incident management. We also initiated an Education Managers forum with adjacent clubs, to discuss issues and improved training and assessment at our clubs. We introduced compulsory annual AGM training, to ensure they are armed with the latest coaching techniques. Our club also improved the advertising reach of all clubs, creating the 'Ocean Swims by SLSC' Facebook group, to increase revenue from nine club's fundraising swims. We created online tools to improve member's competency in responding to a first aid incident, trainer and assessor currency and patrol quizzes to keep our members' skills sharp. We engaged with our community through the multicultural beach safety school program, the Pink Patrol and led the Port and Leighton Planning group with local Government, City of Fremantle and Fremantle Ports.



Patrol Club of the Year (finalist)

Our Club met all requirements of the Lifesaving Agreement with the City of Fremantle. We continued to be a top 'training' club with 250 new awards delivered and continue to successfully deploy jet skis, IRB's and drones to supplement our foot patrols. For the second year, we ran the first two patrols as "leadership patrols" for our patrol leadership teams. For the first time, our Lifesaving team addressed issues of mental wellbeing by bringing the 'Outside the Locker Room' team for some workshops. And, even though we started working on additional shark detection buoys before the shark incident in November, we pushed for and received an additional detector and warning system at Port Beach.

Woodside Nippers Club of the Year

Our nipper numbers continue to remain strong at around 600 kids. This year, there has been a big focus on Surf Sports participation and we have seen a 34 percent increase in our Nippers competing at States. We have also put our AGM's through a compulsory AGM session to ensure everyone is using the latest techniques.

Young Volunteer of the Year (James Currey, finalist)

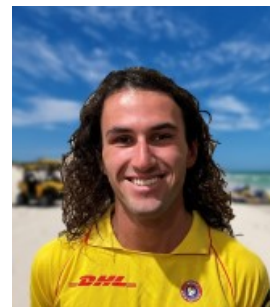
This year was James' second as Captain of his 'Flo' Patrol. He has worked tirelessly to encourage interaction between younger and more mature members of his patrol. He completed 30 patrol hours and acted as the Patrol Captain for the Christmas patrol for the second year. James is also a valuable



member of the Lifesaving Committee, acting as Patrol Officer in charge of the Team Lists and Rosters. He has begun his Trainer journey, supporting the training of our new SRC's. In Surf Sports, James is the Surf Sports Committee Secretary, and competed in IRB's and surf boats, winning bronze medals in both at States. He has also completed his S2 sweep accreditation. But perhaps his greatest love is for his Under 10 Nipper group, as their Age Group Manager. James is a fantastic role model for younger members in our Club.

Youth Lifesaver of the Year (Jake Silipo, finalist)

Jake's love of powercraft saw him this year become an IRB trainer and deliver two IRB Crew courses and an IRB Driver course. Even though aged only 20, Jake's natural leadership skills continued to develop as Patrol Captain of 'Bubbles' patrol. In addition, Jake took on the Vehicle and Radio Officer role on the Life Saving and Education Committee. Jake is an enthusiastic member of our RWC patrols, in particular the Abalone Patrols this season, as well as providing water safety for the Fremantle Ocean Classic. He is also an SLSWA Lifeguard and competes in IRB racing and surf boats.



Assessor of the Year (Mike Shaw, finalist)

Mike has been our Club's most active trainer and assessor, having participated in all SRC, BM and ART skills maintenance sessions this season, plus has conducted BM assessments at Swanbourne and North Cottesloe, generally as Assessor-in-charge. Having witnessed the difficulties in organising assessors from other clubs to come to Fremantle for our BM assessments, Mike initiated a continuing forum of the Education Managers from the adjacent clubs, to discuss common issues, and included setting up a shared calendar where all training and assessment activities are listed and assessors can 'sign up' for assessments. Mike has also developed an online solution to the issues of maintaining trainer and assessor currency of qualifications, where all our club trainers and assessors can record their activities (at the time of the event), resulting in a complete database of activities for submission to State Centre.



Support Operations Volunteer of the Year (John Summers, finalist)

This award is nominated by State Centre, not by our Club, so this is an outstanding recognition of John's long contribution to lifesaving. John is an active member of the Emergency Response Team and was the first port of call to attend numerous searches for missing people, in conjunction with WA Police. John has also been an active RWC patroller for each of the WA Abalone patrols around Penguin Island.



Director of Finance Report

It is my pleasure to present the Audited Financial Report for the Club for the 12 month period ending 31 March 2022.

RESULT FOR THE YEAR

The Club has recorded a net profit of \$150,304 for the year after amortisation, depreciation and accounting adjustments, but before capital expenditure.

The result for the year has exceeded our expectations, and reflects the high level of member activity at, and engagement with, the Club. Income from membership fees increased by 3.1% on the previous year, income from sales increased by 11.7%, income from club rental and hire almost doubled, and income from social and fundraising went up 22.5%. The Club experienced another strong year in terms of donations, sponsorship and grants.

INCOME

Our major sources of income were -

STATEMENT OF FINANCIAL POSITION

As at 31 March 2022, the Club's net assets were valued at \$2,448,767. The Club's cash assets amounted to \$570,169 as at 31 March 2021.

LOOKING FORWARD

Since April 2018, the Club has increased its cash reserves from \$235,000 to \$570,000. A significant portion of our cash reserves has been allocated towards future capital expenditure on the building.

At this point in time, we believe the Club is in a strong financial position and has the resources to survive any further disruptions like those experienced in relation to the COVID pandemic.

At the time of writing this report, the Board is in the process of finalising the 2022-23 Budget. It is not anticipated that there will be a cash surplus from this budget, as there will be a higher level of capital expenditure in the coming year. However, we will be ensuring that cash reserves remain strong.

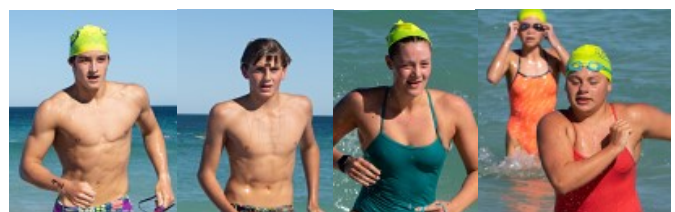

Tragic shark death - a first on our beach

Shark attack! Two words any patrolling clubbie never wants to hear. Unfortunately, on November 6th 2021 - eerily, twenty-one years to the day since Ken Crew was attacked in shallow water off Cottesloe Beach - our Community felt that pain at Port Beach. At around 10am, a local swimmer, 57 year old Paul Millachip, father to two and good friend to many, went for his usual morning swim when he was attacked. However, the attack was witnessed by four young boys in a couple of small boats, and their reaction to attempt to both help Paul and to warn everyone in the water and on the beach can only be described as 'heroic'.

Patrol Captain on the beach that morning was Annabelle Standing, leading 'Gill' patrol. When the call came in, Annie, her patrol and supported by some senior Club members who happened to be on Leighton Beach that morning, reacted swiftly, moving personnel, vehicles and major bleeds kits down to Port Beach, believing that a major trauma was happening. Unfortunately, it became quickly apparent that Paul was missing and the response turned to trying to find him.

Our patrol members worked tirelessly to support the response team comprising WA Police, St John Paramedics, City of Fremantle Rangers, Department of Fisheries and Fremantle Volunteer Sea Rescue. One of our jet skis soon joined in to the water search. WA Police made use of our Port Beach Annex to conduct interviews and

debrief the four young witnesses, and we supplied vehicles to move personnel up and down the beach during the search.

After the search was halted on that first day, a quick debrief was held with our patrol members to ensure that their mental health was being looked after, and to discuss the possible side effects of such a traumatic incident. Club Peer Support Officers kept in touch with the patrol over the next few days, checking in to make sure they were coping.

After the search was wound down, the Lifesaving leadership team took some time to consider and evaluate our response to an incident that went far above our normal training. While we could not have asked for any better performance from our members, it was clear that we could provide our Patrol Captains and Vice Captains some extended training in managing critical incidents - in particular, around communication, teamwork and hands-off leadership.

So, a half-day program was developed in-house (recognising that the new Patrol Captains course was at least 1-2 years away) covering the theoretical aspects above, but then put around ten of our PC/VC's through three realistic scenarios, which included use of radio communications (including 'Surfcom') and patients. We intend to continue this training next season, to ensure our patrol leadership has the best training possible for such incidents in the future.

Life Saving Report

The 2021-22 season has seen a tremendous effort from all members young and old. A huge thank you to everyone for your dedication this season. As a team, we have continued to develop the skills and attributes so critical to that of effective life savers.

This season saw 350 members clocking up 5,101 patrolling hours plus 2258 water safety hours. Our beach attendance for the patrol season grew again to over 126,000 with one rescue recorded, 32 first aid actions and 2,633 preventative actions. The season was unlike others with COVID disruptions and the unfortunate Port Beach shark incident in November. Despite the incident outcome, it was incredibly reassuring to see so many members jumping in to assist on the day, as well as the weeks and months following. The Club has drawn strength and learnings from this tragic event and is better placed moving forward. Let's continue to look out for and support everyone within our big surf family.

In true Fremantle form, we have continued to provide great opportunities for member development, which is thanks to the Club's wonderful trainers and assessors off the beach, as well as on the beach with our leadership teams within each patrol group. Our Patrol Captains, Vice Captains, IRB Drivers and IRB Crew's efforts and dedication to improve our patrol teams abilities is greatly appreciated by all members and the public. Our fundamental purpose is to patrol the beach and many members, especially Patrol Captains, have stepped up when it was needed most, so we are very grateful for your commitment.

Our members have not only shown commitment to patrolling Leighton, Port and Mosman Beaches, we have also had great representation off the beach, where our members have rendered their assistance to those in need outside of patrols. We have hosted events like the FOC and Port to Pub (which was unfortunately cancelled), have helped at abalone patrols, have provided water safety at State competitions, and provided water safety and first aid to a number of events in and around Fremantle. Our young life

You have all helped ensure the members of the club are supported in all areas from gear and equipment through to training and member development. Without you, we would not have the equipment on the beach, courses to develop our skills and activities to meet new people.

Don't forget that what we do matters. We develop our members to save lives and when we stand on the beach wearing our red and yellow uniform we are seen as being of the highest calibre. Education Report

Even though our ability to deliver excellent training was hampered by the impacts of COVID, we still managed to deliver over 260 new awards (up substantially on last year's 209) - this on top of several hundred Bronze Medallion (BM), Surf Rescue Certificate (SRC) and Advanced Resuscitation Techniques (ART) skills maintenance checks. We couldn't do this without the outstanding support of our trainers and assessors - Peter Hastie, John Price, Mark Regel, Larry Tilbury, Pip Hawson, John Summers, Rachelle Doyle, Jess Simpson, Liam Burke, Madeleine Stockden, Jake Silipo, Dylan Ewart, James Birkmanis, Liz Pitts, Cath Morgan, Jay Morgan, Ian Clarke, Kelly Aitken-Fox and Lawson Mills. As always, your enthusiasm has been greatly valued !

As for many years, we ran three BM courses, including two of the now very popular week-long Intensive courses, delivering 50 new patrolling BM members onto our beaches. As ART is now a priority award for our patrols, in order to be able to deliver oxygen, and Provide First Aid is now a prerequisite award for this, we ran several First Aid and ART courses. The purchase of an additional advanced airway manikin, and a second wound packing trainer, has significantly improved our delivery of both ART award and skills maintenance sessions.

This season saw a significant increase in the number of SRC awards (adult and youth) - the major increase occurred when Santa Maria school asked to bring down twenty of their girls to undertake this training. While we are pleased and excited about this new relationship, it put an almost intolerable strain on our trainers' abilities to deliver high quality training to this many people in a single group. If we are to sustain this level of activity, we will need to explore alternatives such as running an intensive SRC course during the September school holidays (in the week before the intensive Bronze course) in order to break the group into two.

For the first time, we were able to deliver the Training Officer qualification in-house, rather than at State Centre. This is a major step forward to increase our trainer (and assessor) numbers, and proved to be a great opportunity to share knowledge and learning across clubs, as twelve members from six different clubs participated in our session. A wonderful success !

This season also saw a welcome return to training the Pain Management award, after a two year hiatus. After much work by SLSA and SLSWA to have our licence to deliver Methoxyflurane (aka the 'Green Whistle') reinstated, John Summers delivered two training and requalification sessions to get our patrolling members back up to speed.

The only award we are still waiting to be able to deliver is the Silver Medallion Patrol Captain course (which used to be known as Beach Management). The resources for this updated curriculum have been several years in the making, and we have many of our younger PC's and VC's who would benefit immensely from this training. We believe that SLSWA will have the new resources and at least one of our trainers qualified to deliver this course at the start of next season.

In the meantime, and as a result of the tragic shark attack at Port Beach, John Summers and I developed some in-house critical incident training for our patrol leadership team. The half-day session, was delivered to around ten of our leaders and covered theoretical aspects of communication, teamwork, hands-off leadership and interaction with emergency services, followed by three complex real-life scenarios - including simulated patients and use of radios.

The Life Saving and Education Committee would like to applaud Jess Simpson as this year's winner of the Club's Trainer/Assessor of the Year. In addition to being our Life Saving Manager, Jess not only

coordinated and delivered the training to our Youth SRC cohort (ably supported of course by Madeleine Stockden and our other trainers), but in between, she also managed to fit in some Bronze training and contributed to almost all of the BM and SRC skills maintenance checks early in the summer. We thank you Jess for your amazing dedication !

Our commercial training this year was somewhat reduced on previous years, mainly due to COVID restrictions, but our volunteer and unpaid trainers - Kelly Aitken-Fox, Lawson Mills, John Summers, Leanne Coverley-Brandis, plus myself - still delivered six courses covering Community Surf Rescue and Provide First Aid, bringing in \$4,580 to the Club. Huge thanks these energetic trainers for their generosity !

Finally, we delivered our Multicultural Beach and Surf Safety training for the eighth year to our usual schools - Lynwood SHS and Aranmore CC. This year we had a record number of participants (around 120) and these in-class and beach sessions are something that the students look forward to each year.

My heartfelt thanks to everyone who contributed to maintaining our excellent reputation for high quality training this year.

Age Group Manager Refresher Training

While we do see many former Nipper members return with their own children later in life, few parents are senior members themselves, and many are experiencing surf life saving for the first time.

Youth Development Report

The Youth Program at Fremantle has several objectives -

- To facilitate the learning of skills amongst the Youth cohort to enable them to become competent life savers;
- To support those Youth interested in competitive activities to compete successfully at State and hopefully National Championships;
- To create a safe environment in which our Youth can grow and develop leadership skills that are valuable life skills within and outside of the Surf Life Saving environment;
- To provide a diverse range of enjoyable activities, supporting health and fitness, that encourages Youth members to remain within the Surf Life Saving fraternity.

During the 2021-22 season, I and the Youth AGM team - Madeleine Stockden, Chris Cleave, Ian 'Jock' McLachlan, Rod Pavolich, Kate Schick - sought to achieve these objectives with a group of 239 Youth members (U/14's - 54, U/15's - 62, U/17's - 79 and U/19's - 44).

We were also supported by many of our other volunteer trainers and assessors to ensure achievement in these important life saving awards. 2021-22 Youth Program

The structured elements of the Bronze and SRC training occupied the first ten weeks of the twenty-week season for the Under 14's and Under 16's. Outside of these training programs, the beach activities consisted of warmups, Club swims, semi-competitive surf training sports and generally concluded with recreational sports such as volleyball.

During January, there was a strong focus on the Club Swim and Club Run events leading to awards presented at the Surf Sports Awards Night. In addition, there was an introductory session on skis provided by Jon Standing and helpers, and a board training session run by Matt Elliott.

During February, 52 Youth spent a day together on Rottneest Island, cycling, swimming, snorkelling and generally relaxing with their peers. The support and enthusiasm for the Rottneest trip was almost unprecedented and indicate that social and leisure activities are an important reason why the Youth become members at our Club.

As part of the Club's recognition of the importance of the region to the local indigenous people, a Youth "hoodie" was designed, using the sand mural generated by Roni Forrest from WILDFIRE, an Indigenous Education and Cultural Consultancy firm. The hoodies were presented to the Youth by Roni and Simon Forrest, who emphasised the importance of youth in the indigenous culture and the role our Youth can play in raising the level of recognition of indigenous culture in our community.

An additional activity post-season was for Youth members to march with the HMAS Sydney Association alongside the veterans in the ANZAC Day parade. The Association is enthusiastic for this involvement to continue due to the long-standing relationship between our Club and the HMAS Sydney Memorial.

Training and Leadership Development

In total, 67 Youth graduated with the SRC award and 33 Youth gained their Bronze Medallion awards. All of these graduates have all been rostered into surf life saving patrols at Fremantle and are to be congratulated for the considerable time and commitment to achieve these awards and join our volunteering patrolling community in Surf Life Saving.

Thanks to the Life Saving Committee for their ongoing support for the surf sports section of our Club. As a collective we can achieve great things.

The coaching plan is currently being reviewed and tweaked with the aim to continue to build coaching capacity through training/mentoring and provide more opportunities for our athletes. Ensuring that our Sunday morning club swim and handicap races continue to be the highlight of our Sunday morning activities and that all prestigious senior Club Championships are well represented will be a focus for next season.

Training programs and opportunities continue to be offered to our members across all areas within surf sports, with the need to provide our members with access to first class coaching resources still a priority. We hope to see an increased number of members participate in these training opportunities and the aim is to provide alternative pathways for existing and new members to transition between all areas of surf sports (including Pool Rescue, IRB, Surf Boats & Surf Skis) and most importantly build on our strong culture of surf sports competitors maintaining their enthusiastic and positive approach to their lifesaving and patrol obligations.

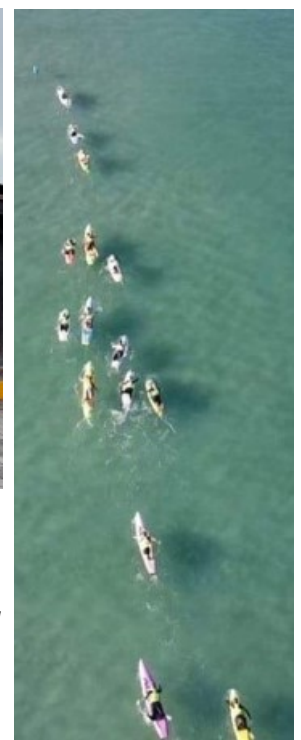
Another great year with the Fremantle Nipper Boarders in 2021. In 2021, our Nipper Boarders increased their focus on training at as many different locations as possible. Training on the Swan River during winter months and hitting the waves at Secret Harbour and Scarborough throughout the year, we managed to have some great adventures up and down our coast.

The Fremantle Nipper Board Program focus is to include Nippers from all levels of Board Paddling experience - whether they are new to Surf Club, or Nippers pushing for medals at State Championships. In 2021, our Club introduced for the first time Little Nipper Board Training, which provided introductory Board Paddling sessions to our U/8's and U/9's from our Youth Board Coaches. The training sessions received great feedback and we are all excited about strengthening the Little Nipper Board Paddling in 2022.

To increase our competitiveness at State Championships in 2022, there was a big focus on increasing our weekly training volume compared to previous years. Starting in September on Saturday afternoons, the Nipper Board Training program increased gradually throughout the year to five days a week in January and February. This provided a great platform and best opportunity for our Nippers to perform at the 2022 State Championships.

Another 2021 Nipper Board Training aim was to provide cross functional training to improve our board paddling performance. This helped to increase our overall strength, power and endurance while maintaining interest in our program. The Nipper Board Training introduced cross training activities such as boxing, functional beach weights such as kettle bells and ball slams. Our Nippers were regularly seen doing sprints over the pedestrian bridge with weight vests and awkward objects.

To further improve the provision of Nipper Board Coaching, our 2021 aim was to increase the number of Nipper Board Coaches for the following season. This season, we managed to increase our coaches from one to seven - with the introduction of Dean, Courtney, and Adam plus our two Youth Board Coaches, Riley and Matilda. Our hope is through the increased number of coaches we will be able to increase the number and timing of training sessions in 2022.

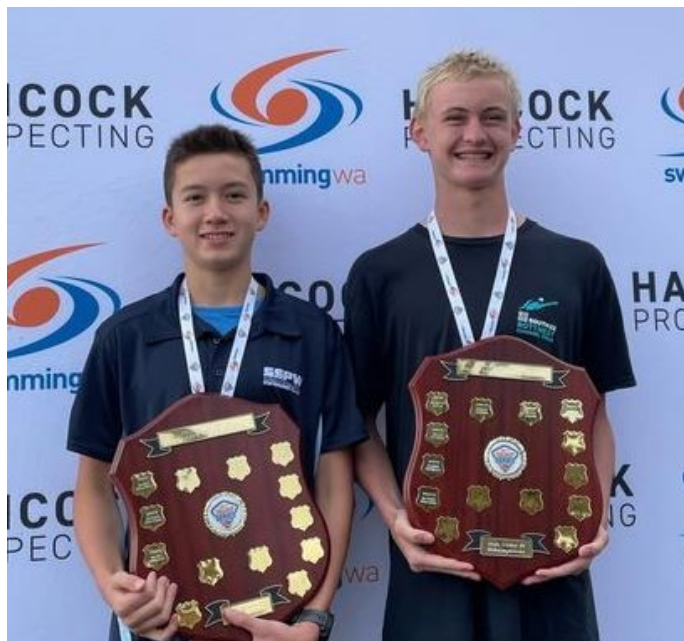



Note 1: Statement of significant accounting policies

The report, except for the cash flow information, has been prepared on an accruals basis in that it accounts for debtors, creditors, employee provisions and prepaid building lease income, but has not included other accruals and prepayments in order to be consistent with year accounting treatment. The report is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values, or except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following material accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

(a) Income tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the association is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

(b) Property, plant and equipment

Property

Freehold land and buildings are measured at their fair value (being the amount for which an asset could be exchanged between knowledgeable willing parties in an arm's length transaction), based on periodic, but at least triennial, valuations by external independent valuers, less subsequent depreciation for buildings.

Increases in the carrying amount arising on revaluation of land and buildings are credited to a revaluation surplus in equity. Decreases that offset previous increases of the same asset are charged against fair value reserves directly in equity. Decreases that offset previous increases of the same asset are charged against fair value reserves directly in equity; all other decreases are charged to the statement of comprehensive income.

Any accumulated depreciation at the date of revaluation is eliminated against the gross carrying amount of the asset and the net amount is restated to the revalued amount of the asset.

Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by the committee to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount of those assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows which will be received from the assets' employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have not been discounted to their present values determining recovering amounts.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets, excluding land and buildings, are depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset was held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

(c) Cash on hand

Cash on hand included cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

(d) Accounts receivable and other debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors includes amounts due from customers. Receivable expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivable are classified as non-current assets.

(e) Revenue and other income

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

If conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

Cash receipts are recognised as income when they are deposited into the bank account

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

(f) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australia Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

(g) Accounts payable and other payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days or recognition of the liability.

(h) Employee provisions

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee provisions have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled

(i) Leases

Leases of PPE, where substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset (but not the legal ownership) are transferred to the association, are classified as finance leases.

Finance leases are capitalised by recording an asset and a liability at the lower of the amounts equal to the fair value of the leased property or the present value of the minimum lease payments, including any guaranteed residual values. Lease payments are allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for that period

Leased assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter of their estimated useful lives or the lease term. Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses in the periods in which they are incurred

(j) Impairment of assets

At the end of each reporting period, the committee reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value in use, to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised in the income and expenditure statement

(k) Inventories on hand

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost or net realisable value.

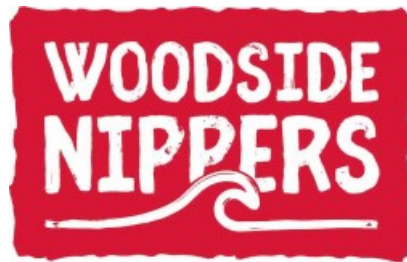
